

Statement of Volatility

Dell Pro P 24 USB-C Hub Webcam Monitor P2426HEV

The Dell P2426HEV monitor contains both volatile and non-volatile components. Volatile components erase their data immediately after power is removed from the component. Non-volatile components continue to retain their data even after power is removed from the component. The following non-volatile components are present on the Dell P2426HEV monitor system board.

Serial Flash ROM W25X40CLSNIG	U1903	Non-volatile Flash memory, 4M bit. To store HUB1 firmware.	No	The part is installed on the Interface Board and is configured with both hardware and software-level write protection.
Serial Flash ROM W25X40CLSNIG	U1906	Non-volatile Flash memory, 4M bit. To store HUB2 firmware.	No	The part is installed on the Interface Board and is configured with both hardware and software-level write protection.
