DEAR SHARP CUSTOMER

Thank you for your purchase of a SHARP LCD product. To ensure safety and many years of trouble-free operation of your product, please read the Safety Precautions carefully before using this product.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Electricity is used to perform many useful functions, but it can also cause personal injuries and property damage if improperly handled. This product has been engineered and manufactured with the highest priority on safety. However, improper use can result in electric shock and/or fire. In order to prevent potential danger, please observe the following instructions when installing, operating and cleaning the product. To ensure your safety and prolong the service life of your LCD product, please read the following precautions carefully before using the product.

1. Read instructions — All operating instructions must be read and understood before the product is operated.
2. Keep this manual in a safe place — These safety and operating instructions must be kept in a safe place for future reference.
3. Observe warnings — All warnings on the product and in the instructions must be observed closely.
4. Follow instructions — All operating instructions must be followed.
5. Cleaning — Unplug the power cord from the AC outlet before cleaning the product. Use a dry cloth to clean the product. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners.
6. Attachments — Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer. Use of inadequate attachments can result in accidents.
7. Water and moisture — Do not use the product near water. Do not install the product in a place where water may splash onto it. Be careful of equipment which drains water such as an air-conditioner.
8. Ventilation — The vents and other openings in the cabinet are designed for ventilation. Do not cover or block these vents and openings since insufficient ventilation can cause overheating and/or shorten the life of the product. Do not place the product on a sofa, rug or other similar surface, since they can block ventilation openings. Do not place the product in an enclosed place such as a bookcase or rack, unless proper ventilation is provided or the manufacturer's instructions are followed.
9. Power cord protection — The power cords must be routed properly to prevent people from stepping on them or objects from resting on them.
10. The LCD panel used in this product is made of glass. Therefore, it can break when the product is dropped or applied with impact. Be careful not to be injured by broken glass pieces in case the LCD panel breaks.
11. Overloading — Do not overload AC outlets or extension cords. Overloading can cause fire or electric shock.
12. Entering of objects and liquids — Never insert an object into the product through vents or openings. High voltage flows in the product, and inserting an object can cause electric shock and/or short internal parts. For the same reason, do not spill water or liquid on the product.
13. Servicing — Do not attempt to service the product yourself. Removing covers can expose you to high voltage and other dangerous conditions. Request a qualified service person to perform servicing.
14. Repair — If any of the following conditions occurs, unplug the power cord from the AC outlet, and request a qualified service person to perform repairs.

15.  - Install the batteries with due attention to the plus (+) and minus (-) sides of the batteries according to the instructions in the compartment.
 - Do not mix old and new batteries.
 - Do not mix batteries of different types. Voltage specifications of batteries of the same shape may vary.
 - Replace an exhausted battery with a new one promptly.
 - If you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.
 - If leaked battery fluid gets on your skin or clothing, rinse immediately and thoroughly. If it gets into your eye, bathe your eye well rather than rubbing and seek medical treatment immediately. Leaked battery fluid that gets into your eye or your clothing may cause a skin irritation or damage your eye.
20. Usage of the monitor must not be accompanied by fatal risks or dangers that, could lead directly to death, personal injury, severe physical damage or other loss, including nuclear reaction control in nuclear facility, medical life support system, and missile launch control in a weapon system.
21. Do not stay in contact with the parts of the product that become hot for long periods of time. Doing so may result in low-temperature burns. If you need to move the monitor after it has been in use, it may be hot. Turn off the power and make sure it has cooled sufficiently before moving.

However, there may be minute points on the screen where pixels never light or are permanently lit. Also, if the screen is viewed from an acute angle there may be uneven colors or brightness. Please note that these are not malfunctions but common phenomena of LCDs and will not affect the performance of the monitor.
- Do not display a still picture for a long period, as this could cause a residual image.
- Never rub or tap the monitor with hard objects.
- Please understand that SHARP CORPORATION bears no responsibility for errors made during use by the customer or a third party, nor for any other malfunctions or damage to this product arising during use, except where indemnity liability is recognized under law.
- This monitor and its accessories may be upgraded without advance notice.
- Do not use the monitor where there is a lot of dust, where humidity is high, or where the monitor may come into contact with oil or steam. Do not use in an environment where there are corrosive gases (sulfur dioxide, hydrogen sulfide, nitrogen dioxide, chlorine, ammonia, ozone, etc.). As this could lead to fire.
- Ensure that the monitor does not come into contact with water or other fluids. Ensure that no objects such as paper clips or pins enter the monitor as this could lead to fire or electric shock.
- Do not place the monitor on top of unstable objects or in unsafe places. Do not allow the monitor to receive strong shocks or to strongly vibrate. Causing the monitor to fall or topple over may damage it.

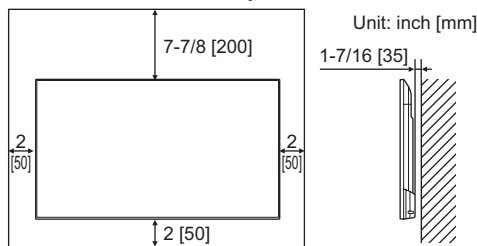
LED Backlight

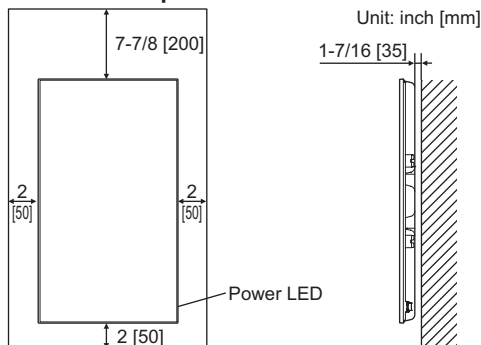
MOUNTING PRECAUTIONS

- This product is for use indoors.
- A mounting bracket compliant with VESA specifications is required.
- Since the monitor is heavy, consult your dealer before installing, removing or moving the monitor.
- Mounting the monitor on the wall requires special expertise and the work must be performed by an authorized SHARP dealer. You should never attempt to perform any of this work yourself. Our company will bear no responsibility for accidents or injuries caused by improper mounting or mishandling.
- Use the monitor with the surface perpendicular to a level surface. If necessary, the monitor may be tilted up to 20 degrees upward or downward.
- When moving the monitor, be sure to hold it with the handles, the unit bottom and sides. Do not grasp the screen and corners. This may cause product damage, failure, or injury.
- This monitor should be used at an ambient temperature between 32°F (0°C) and 104°F (40°C). Provide enough space around the monitor to prevent heat from accumulating inside.

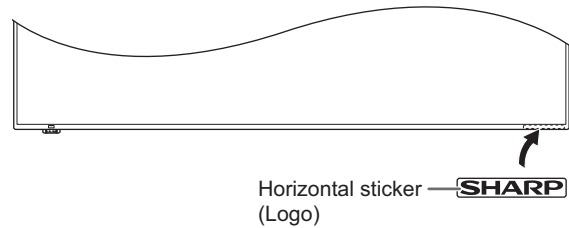

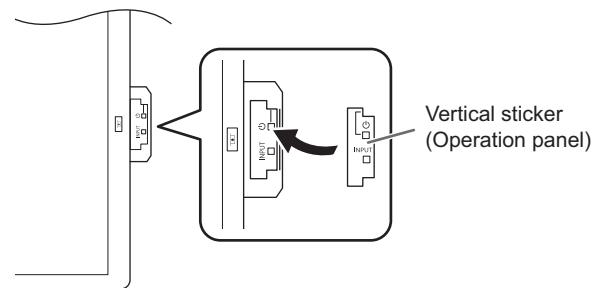
- If it is difficult to provide sufficient space for any reason such as the installation of the monitor inside a housing, or if the ambient temperature may be outside of the range of 32°F (0°C) to 104°F (40°C), install a fan or take other measures to keep the ambient temperature within the required range.
- Temperature condition may change when using the monitor together with the optional equipments recommended by SHARP. In such cases, please check the temperature condition specified by the optional equipments.
- Do not block any ventilation openings. If the temperature inside the monitor rises, this could lead to a malfunction.
- Do not place the monitor on a device which generates heat.

- Adhere to the following when installing the monitor in its portrait orientation. Failing to adhere to the following may cause malfunctions.
 - Install the monitor such that the power LED is located on the bottom side.
 - Set the MONITOR on the MONITOR menu to PORTRAIT. (See page 28.)
- Even when the ambient temperature is 104°F (40°C) or less in a portrait installation, the brightness of the backlight may automatically decrease if the temperature inside the monitor becomes too hot. This is to prevent further heating of the interior.
- Use the supplied sticker.

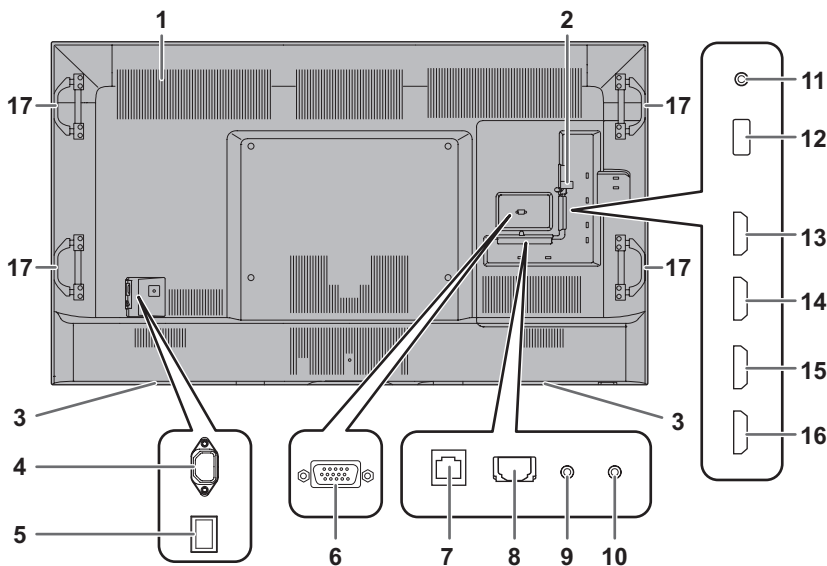

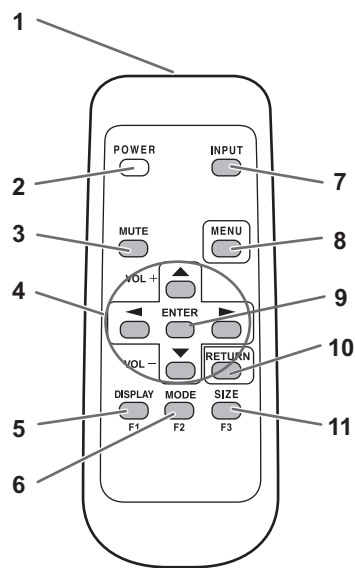

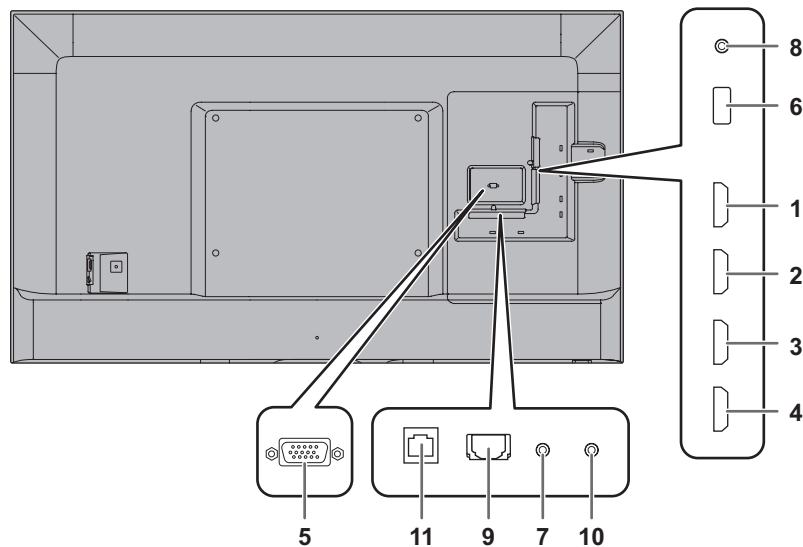

Connecting Peripheral Equipment



! Caution

- Be sure to turn off the main power switch and disconnect the plug from the power outlet before connecting/ disconnecting cables. Also, read the manual of the equipment to be connected.
- Be careful not to confuse the input terminal with the output terminal when connecting cables. Accidentally reversing cables connected to the input and output terminals may cause malfunctions and the other problems.
- Do not use any cable that has a damaged or deformed terminal. Using such cables may cause malfunctions.

TIPS

- Images may not be displayed properly depending on the computer (video card) to be connected.
- Perform automatic adjustment using SCREEN POSITION of INPUT SELECT in the SETUP menu when a PC screen is displayed using D-SUB, or when the setting of the PC is changed.
- If the audio output from the playback device is connected directly to speakers or other devices, the video on the monitor may appear delayed from the audio portion. Audio should be played through this monitor by connecting the playback device to the monitor's audio input, and connecting the monitor's audio output to the speakers or other devices.

When the connection between HDMI1 to HDMI3 and HDMI4 is switched, it could be necessary to reconfigure the computer.

*2 The HDMI1 input terminal is compatible with ARC (Audio Return Channel).

To connect an ARC-compatible audio device using an HDMI cable, connect to the HDMI1 input terminal.

*3 The HDMI4 input terminal is compatible with MHL (Mobile High-Definition Link).

An MHL-compatible smartphone can be connected using a commercially available MHL cable to show video from the smartphone on the monitor while charging the smartphone. When a MHL is connect, the input is automatically switched to HDMI4.

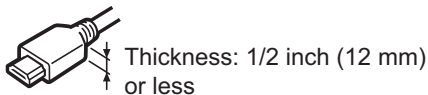

*4 For a 3840 × 2160 (60 Hz) video signal

- HDMI1 - 3 input terminals are compatible with 4:4:4, 4:2:2, and 4:2:0 formats.
- HDMI4 input terminal is only compatible with 4:2:0 format.

If ARC connection is not necessary while inputting 4:2:0 format, use the HDMI4 input terminal. If an HDMI1 - 3 input terminal is used and a computer with significant noise in the signal is connected, the video or audio may not be output correctly.

- Connect with a commercially available HDMI certified cable (a high-speed type is recommended). For the following, use a high-speed HDMI cable:
 - When connecting a device that is compatible with 4K2K output.
 - When inputting a 1080p video signal
- When using the supplied DisplayPort-HDMI conversion cable, use the HDMI1 - 3 input terminal.
- When using the audio input terminal with HDMI input, use the HDMI3 input terminal and set AUDIO SELECT of INPUT SELECT in the SETUP menu to HDMI + ANALOG.

5. PC D-sub input terminal

- When using the audio input terminal with the PC D-sub input terminal, set AUDIO SELECT of INPUT SELECT in the SETUP menu to VIDEO + AUDIO.
- When using the PC D-sub input terminal, space is required behind the monitor.

6. USB port

- Connect a USB flash drive to the USB port.
- Do not connect a USB device other than a USB flash drive.
- Turn off the power of the monitor when removing a USB flash drive.

- Do not use a USB flash drive with a security function or a write protection function.
- Use a USB flash drive with a shape that can be inserted in the USB port. Some USB flash drives with special shapes cannot be inserted. Do not forcibly insert a USB flash drive. This may damage the connector and cause failure.

7. Audio input terminal

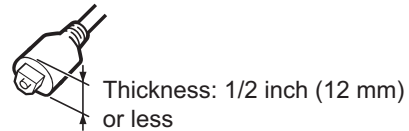
- This is used to input analog audio when video is shown using the HDMI3 input terminal or the PC D-sub input terminal. Check the setting in AUDIO SELECT of INPUT SELECT in the SETUP menu.
- Use an audio cable without resistance.

8. Headphone terminal

- Use commercially available headphones (mini stereo jack).
- The output sound varies depending on the input mode.
- The volume can be adjusted using the volume adjustment.
- When headphones are connected to the headphone terminal, sound is not output from the monitor speakers.

9. Digital audio output (optical) terminal

- You can output MPEG2 AAC / Dolby Digital audio format from the monitor.
- Use the following for the digital audio output (optical) terminal.



10. CONTROL terminal (RS-232C input terminal)

- The monitor can be connected to a PC using the RS-232C conversion cable (supplied) and a commercially available RS-232 straight cable to control the monitor from the PC.

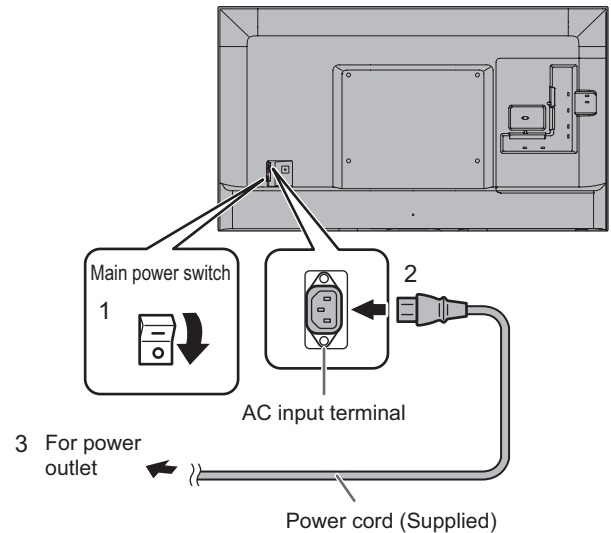
11. LAN terminal

- You can control the monitor from a PC on a network by connecting a commercially available LAN cable between this terminal and a network.

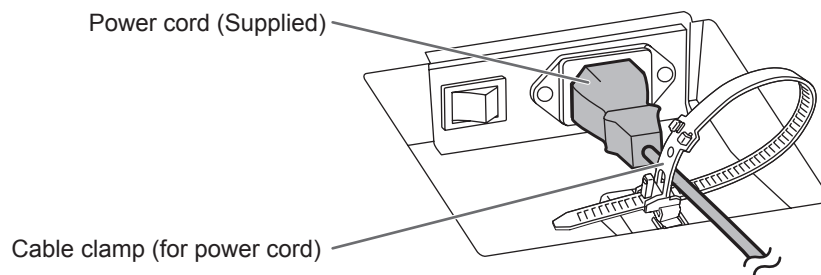

 3. Plug the power cord (supplied) into the AC power outlet.



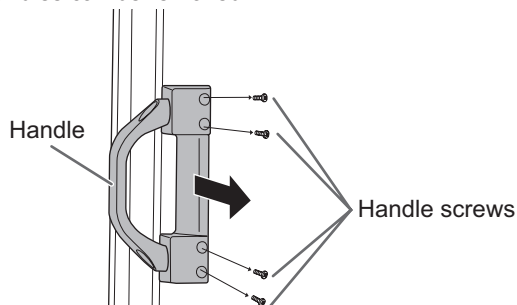
TIPS

- When installing the monitor in landscape orientation, be sure to clamp the power cord (supplied) onto the cable clamp attachment using the supplied cable clamp (for power cord). When clamping the power cord, take care not to stress the terminal of the power cord. Do not bend the power cord excessively. For information on how to attach the cable clamp, see page 15.

The handles can be removed.



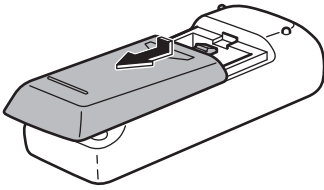

Preparing the Remote Control Unit

Installing the batteries

1. Press the cover gently and slide it in the direction of the arrow.



2. See the instructions in the compartment and put in the supplied batteries (LR-6 ("AA" size) x 2) with their plus (+) and minus (-) sides oriented correctly.
3. Close the cover.

- When the batteries become exhausted, replace them with new (commercially available) batteries.
- The supplied batteries (LR-6 ("AA" size) x 2) may become exhausted quickly depending on how they are stored.
- If you will not be using the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.
- Use manganese or alkaline batteries only.

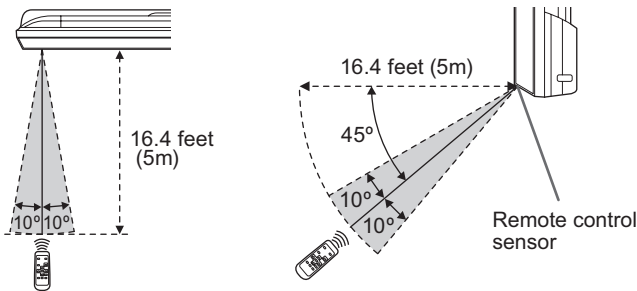

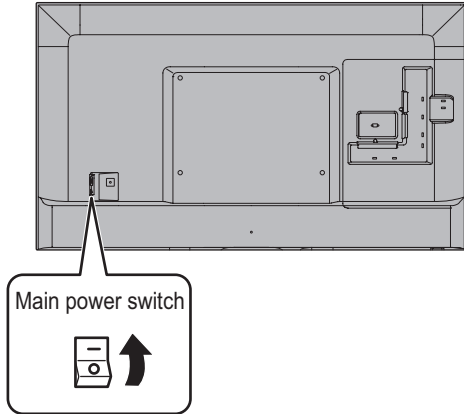
- Do not expose the remote control unit to shock by dropping or stepping on it. This could lead to a malfunction.
- Do not expose the remote control unit to liquids, and do not place it in an area with high humidity.
- The remote control unit may not work properly if the remote control sensor is under direct sunlight or strong lighting.
- Objects between the remote control unit and the remote control sensor may prevent proper operation.
- Replace the batteries when they run low as this may shorten the remote control's operation range.
- If a fluorescent light is illuminated near the remote control unit, it may interfere with proper operation.
- Do not use it with the remote control of other equipment such as air conditioner, stereo components, etc.

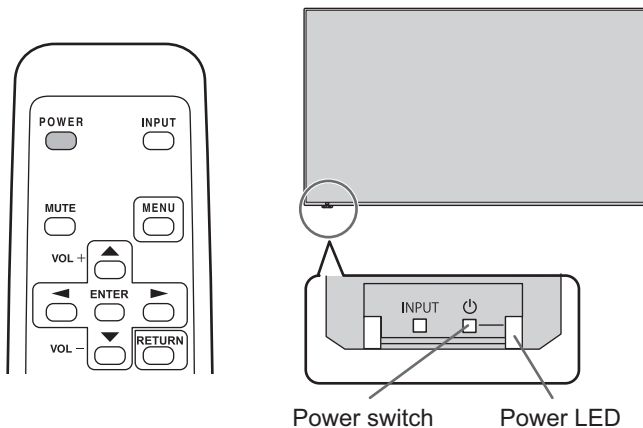

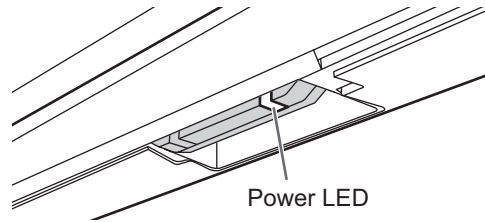

TIPS

■ Operation mode

When the monitor is turned on for the first time after being shipped from the factory, the operation mode setting screen will be displayed. Set it to MODE1 or MODE2.

MODE1....OFF IF NO OPERATION is set to ON, and POWER SAVE MODE is set to ON. (These settings can not be changed.)

If there is no operation for 4 hours or more, the monitor automatically enters standby mode. Power consumption in standby mode is also minimized.

MODE2....Will perform standard operation.

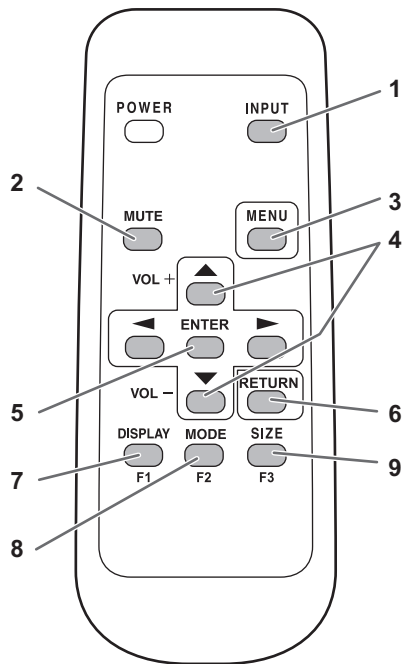

Disabling power on/off operations

- Adobe® RGB SIM. is a color space promoted by Adobe Systems Incorporated. This color space has a wider reproduction range than sRGB and enables the expression of nuanced color tones. Use this mode to express content that is compatible with Adobe RGB.

TIPS

■ Switching the screen size

Even when the screen size is changed, the display may remain the same depending on the input signal.

NORMAL		Displays image so it fills the screen without changing the aspect ratio of the input signals.
WIDE		Displays image so it fills the entire screen.
DOT BY DOT		Displays the dots of the signals input from the connected PC as the corresponding dots on the screen. When the image resolution is 1920x1080 pixels or lower, the image is expanded to twice the height and width of the original.
UNDERSCAN		Displays the image of the input signal without modification.
ZOOM		Displays a CinemaScope or 16:9 size video content in full-screen mode.

TIPS

- Using this monitor's screen-size switching to compress or expand the screen for commercial or public viewing in establishments like cafes or hotels may infringe on the rights of the creators, as protected by Copyright Law, so please be careful.
- The appearance of the original video may change if you select a screen size with a different aspect ratio than the original image (e.g. TV broadcast or video input from external equipment).
- When an ordinary non-wide image (4:3) is viewed with the whole screen using the screen-size switching function of this monitor, the edge of the image may be lost or appear distorted. If you wish to respect the creator's intentions, set the screen size to "NORMAL".
- When playing commercial software, parts of the image (like subtitles) may be cropped. In this case select the optimal screen size using the screen-size switching function of this monitor. With some software, there may be noise or distortion at the edges of the screen. This is due to the characteristics of the software, and is not a malfunction.
- Depending on the original image size, black bands may remain at the edges of the screen.

PICTURE MODE

Changes the picture mode on the screen. The picture mode on the screen can also be changed using a remote control unit. (See page 18.)

BRIGHT

Adjusts the backlight brightness.

CONTRAST

Adjusts the difference between the bright and dark portions of the image.

BLACK LEVEL

Adjusts the entire brightness of the video signals.

TINT

Adjusts the hue. Selecting + changes the color towards green, and selecting - changes it towards magenta.

COLORS

Adjusts the color intensity.

SHARPNESS

Adjusts the sharpness of the image.

COLOR ADJUSTMENT

C.M.S.-HUE

Adjusts color tone with 6 colors of R (red), Y (yellow), G (green), C (cyan), B (blue), and M (magenta).

C.M.S.-SATURATION

Adjusts color vividness with 6 colors of R (red), Y (yellow), G (green), C (cyan), B (blue), and M (magenta).

C.M.S.-VALUE

Adjusts color brightness with 6 colors of R (red), Y (yellow), G (green), C (cyan), B (blue), and M (magenta).

WHITE BALANCE

Adjusts from a bluish white (color temperature: 12000K) to a reddish white (color temperature: 3000K). You can also change the R gain, G gain, and B gain values for each color temperature to perform fine adjustment of the white balance.

GAMMA ADJUSTMENT

Adjusts the gradation difference between bright parts and dark parts of video.

ADVANCED

QUICK SHOOT

- ADVANCED(HIGH), ADVANCED(LOW)..... Using interpolation, this shows video that is normally shown at 60 frames/sec at 120 frames/sec for a smoother picture. However, this may distort the picture of some videos. In this case, set to STANDARD or OFF.
- STANDARD..... This makes scenes with fast action clearer and easier to view.

ACTIVE CONTRAST

- Automatically adjusts the contrast according to the image.
The adjustment operation may not be smooth depending on the image. In this case select OFF.

RESOLUTION

- Adjusts the fineness of the image.

MULTI PIXEL DRIVE

- Adjusts the gradation to widen the angle of view.

PIXEL DIMMING

- Adjusts the contrast of the video.

FILM MODE

- Adjusts so the input signal is video at 24 frames per second.
ADVANCED(HIGH), ADVANCED(LOW).... Play at high-quality for smooth video movement.
STANDARD..... Play video with each frame shown an equal amount of time.

DIGITAL NR

- Reduces block noise caused by digital compression.

MONOCHROME

- Sets the video to black & white.

RESET

Resets the values of current picture mode items in PICTURE menu to factory default values.

■AUDIO

TREBLE

Adjusts the volume of treble-level sound.

BASS

Adjusts the volume of bass-level sound.

BALANCE

Adjusts the balance of the audio sound between right and left.

BAND EXTENSION

Adjusts so that low range and extended range audio from the speakers can be easily heard.

RESET

Resets the values of the AUDIO menu items to factory default values.

■SETUP**LANGUAGE**

Sets the display language for the menu screen.

SLEEP TIMER

When the set time elapses, the monitor automatically enters standby mode. This can be set to up to 23 hours in increments of one hour.

INPUT SELECT**HDMI SETTING**

- HDMI CEC LINKWhen AUTO is selected, HDMI CEC LINK is enabled and the HDMI input terminal changes when playback is started on an external device. When OFF is selected, AUTO POWER ON and AUDIO RETURN CHANNEL cannot be selected.

MONITOR

Selects the installation direction of the monitor.

LANDSCAPELandscape orientation

PORTRAITPortrait orientation. MULTIMEDIA (see page 20) always remains in landscape orientation.

* If video is upside down when the monitor is installed in the portrait orientation, you can rotate the video 180 degrees with PORTRAIT ROTATE (see page 30) in the FUNCTION menu. When this is done, the MONITOR setting cannot be changed.

OPERATION MODE

MODE1OFF IF NO OPERATION is set to ON, and POWER SAVE MODE is set to ON.
(These settings can not be changed.)

POWER SAVE MODE

Character input

For items that require entry of text, press  to display the software keyboard.

Select a character with    , and press  to enter.

- To change the characters entered, select CHAR. SET or press  (F1).
- To switch between upper case and lower case, select CAPS and press .
- To delete characters, select CLEAR or DELETE and press . You can also perform DELETE by pressing  (F2).
- When you are done entering characters, select DONE and press .

Adjustments for PC screen display

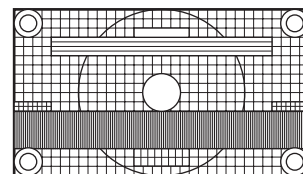

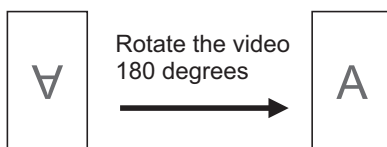

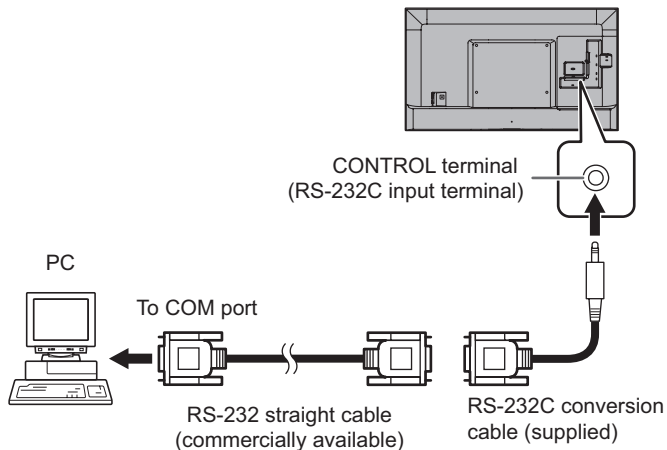

PC connection

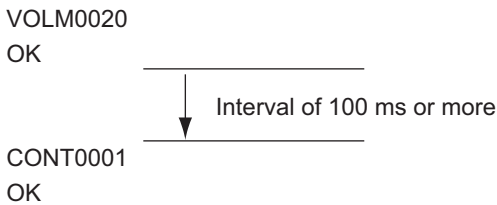


TIPS

- If communication has not been established for reasons such as a bad connection between the PC and monitor, nothing is returned (not even ERR).
- “ERR” may be returned when a command cannot be received correctly due to interference from the surrounding environment.

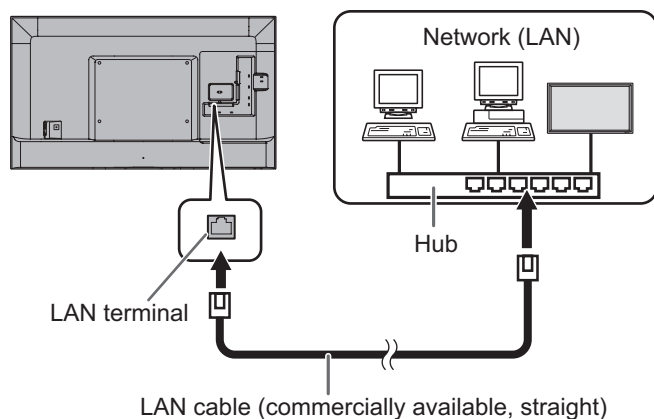

Controlling the Monitor with a PC (LAN)

Your monitor can be connected to a LAN allowing you to control it from a PC on the LAN. The connection requires a commercially available LAN cable (UTP cable, Category 5, straight through).



TIPS

- You must assign an IP address to the monitor by following the procedures in "Settings to connect to a LAN". (See the description on the right.)
- To control the monitor via LAN, set IP CONTROL SETUP to ENABLE. (See page 37.)
- You cannot use RS-232C and LAN control simultaneously.
- When POWER SAVE MODE is ON, control is not possible in standby mode.

Settings to connect to a LAN

Set LAN SETUP and IP CONTROL SETUP in COMMUNICATION SETTING in the SETUP menu. (See page 28.)

5. Set the IP address of the DNS server.

Acquire the IP address of the DNS automatically. (Use the DHCP server function of your network environment.)

NO

Enter the PRIMARY and SECONDARY IP addresses with the software keyboard. (See page 29.) For the values to be entered in each field, check the specifications of your network environment.

7. Select **TEST** with or , and press .







8. Check your settings, select **COMPLETE** with or , and press .

■ IP CONTROL SETUP

1. Set IP control setup to ENABLE.

2. Configure advanced security settings.

Command-based control

(2) Send commands to control the monitor.

- The commands used are the same as those for RS-232C. Refer to the communication procedure (see page 31) for operation.
- Usable commands are provided in the control command table (see page 33).

Troubleshooting

If you are experiencing any problem with your display, before calling for service, please review the following troubleshooting tips.

There is no picture or sound.

- Is the power cord disconnected? (See page 14.)
- Is the main power switch off? (See page 17.)
- Is the monitor in standby mode (the power LED illuminating in orange)? (See page 17.)
- Make sure correct input mode is selected. (See page 18.)
- If any external equipment is connected, make sure the equipment is operating (playing back).

Remote control does not work.

- Are the batteries inserted with polarity (+,-) aligned? (See page 16.)
- Are the batteries exhausted?
- Point the remote control unit toward the monitor's remote control sensor. (See page 16.)
- Is ON SCREEN DISPLAY set to OFF or is operation disabled? (See page 30.)

Sound is heard from only one side.

- Are audio cables connected properly?
- Check the setting of BALANCE for AUDIO menu. (See page 26.)

There is a picture but no sound.

- Is the sound muted?
- Make sure the volume is not set to minimum.
- Are audio cables connected properly?
- Is the setting of INPUT SELECT on the SETUP menu correct? (See page 27.)

Unstable video.

- The signal may be incompatible. (See page 41.)
- Try the automatic screen adjustment when the D-SUB are used. (See page 29.)

The video from the HDMI input terminal does not appear properly.

- Is the setting for HDMI SETTING of INPUT SELECT on the SETUP menu correct? (See page 27.)
- Is the HDMI cable HDMI standard compliant? The monitor will not work with cables that are not standard compliant.
- Is the input signal compatible with this monitor? (See page 41.)
- To show 4K2K video or 1080p video, use a high-speed HDMI cable.
- If connected to a HDMI1 - 3 input terminal while inputting 4:2:0 format, connect to the HDMI4 input terminal. The video and audio of some connected devices may not output correctly because the HDMI1 - 3 input terminals support 3840 x 2160 (60Hz) 4:4:4 or 4:2:2 format. (See page 12.)

The video from PC D-Sub input terminal does not appear correctly.

- Is the setting for SCREEN POSITION of INPUT SELECT on the SETUP menu correct? (See page 27.)
- Is the input signal compatible with this monitor? (See page 41.)

Control buttons do not work.

There is no picture.

- Load noises from outside may be interfering with normal operation. Turn off the power and turn it on after waiting at least 5 seconds, and then check the operation.

Power LED flashes red.

- Hardware has a problem. Turn off the monitor and request repair from your SHARP dealer.

The monitor makes a cracking sound.

- You may occasionally hear a cracking sound from the monitor. This happens when the cabinet slightly expands and contracts according to change in temperature. This does not affect the monitor's performance.

The Power LED is flashing in red and green alternately.

- When the internal temperature of the monitor rises excessively, the brightness of the backlight decreases automatically in order to prevent high-temperature-related problems. If the internal temperature rises further, the monitor automatically enters standby mode and the Power LED blinks red and green alternately.
- Remove the cause of the excessive temperature rise.
 - If the monitor enters standby mode due to a rise in temperature, to return to normal display, turn the power switch off and then back on again. The monitor, however, will enter standby mode again if the cause of the temperature rise is not eliminated. (See page 8.)
 - Check whether the monitor is placed at a location where a quick rise in temperature is likely. Internal temperature rises quickly if the vents on the monitor are blocked.
 - Internal temperature rises quickly if dust accumulates inside the monitor or around the vents. Remove dust if possible. Ask SHARP dealer about removing internal dust.

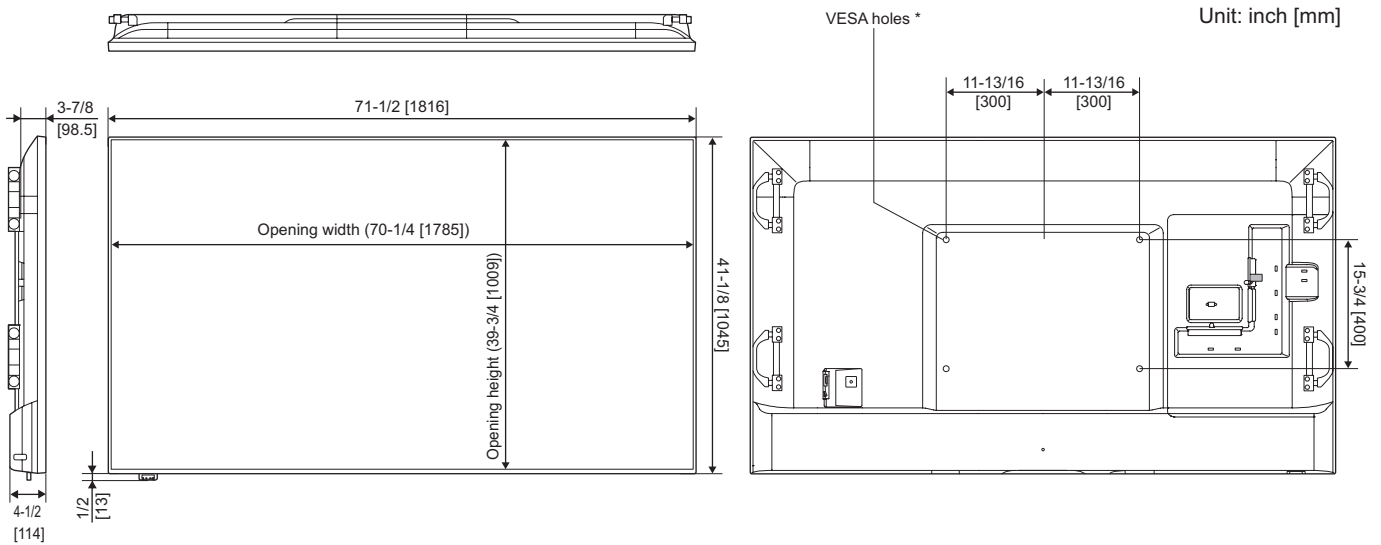

When mounting the monitor, be sure to use a wall-mount bracket that complies with the VESA-compatible mounting method. SHARP recommends using M6 screws and tighten the screws. (See page 52.) Note that screw hole depth of the monitor is 3/8 inch (10 mm). Loose mounting may cause the product to fall, resulting in serious personal injuries as well as damage to the product. The screw and hole should come together with over 5/16 inch (8 mm) length of thread. Use a bracket which has been approved for UL1678 standard, and which can endure at least 4 times or more the weight of the monitor.

DDC is a signal standard for plug and play between monitors and computers. Information about resolution and other parameters is exchanged between the two. This function can be used if the computer supports DDC and it has been configured to detect plug-and-play monitors.

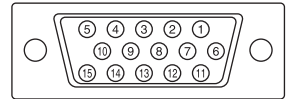
There are several types of DDC, depending on the communication method used. This monitor supports DDC2B.

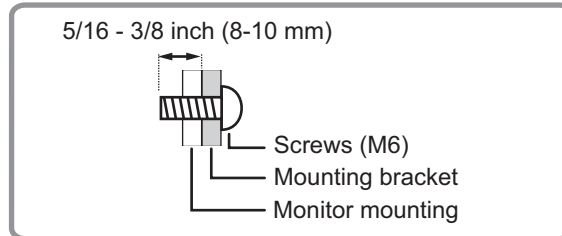
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Mounting Precautions (For SHARP dealers and service engineers)

- When installing, removing or moving the monitor, ensure that this is carried out by at least 3 people.
- Be sure to use a wall-mount bracket designed or designated for mounting the monitor.
- This monitor is designed to be installed on a concrete wall or pillar. Reinforced work might be necessary for some materials such as plaster / thin plastic board / wood before starting installation.
- This monitor and bracket must be installed on a wall which can endure at least 4 times or more the weight of the monitor. Install by the most suitable method for the material and the structure.
- To attach a VESA-compliant mounting bracket, use M6 screws that are 5/16 inch (8 mm) to 3/8 inch (10 mm) longer than the thickness of the mounting bracket.



- Do not use an impact driver.
- When moving the monitor, be sure to hold it with the handles, the unit bottom and sides. Do not grasp the screen and corners. This may cause product damage, failure, or injury.
- If you need to move the monitor after it has been in use, it may be hot. Turn off the power and make sure it has cooled sufficiently before moving.
- After mounting, please carefully ensure the monitor is secure, and not able to come loose from the wall or mount.
- Do not use any screw holes other than VESA holes for installation.

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
