

- 1 Remove the screw (M2x2) that secures the optical-drive assembly to the base cover.
- 2 Using a screwdriver, push the optical drive through the slot to release the optical-drive assembly out of the optical-drive bay.
- **3** Slide the optical-drive assembly out of the optical-drive bay.





- Remove the two screws (M2x3) that secure the optical-drive bracket to the optical drive.
- Remove the optical-drive bracket from optical drive.



6 Pull the optical-drive bezel carefully to remove it from the optical drive.

- 1 Align the tabs on the optical-drive bezel with the slots on the optical drive and snap the optical-drive bezel into place.
- 2 Align the screw holes on the optical-drive bracket with the screw holes on the optical drive.
- **3** Replace the two screws (M2x3) that secure the optical-drive bracket to the optical drive.
- 4 Slide the optical-drive assembly into the optical-drive bay.
- 5 Align the screw hole on the optical-drive bracket with the screw hole on the base cover.
- **6** Replace the screw (M2x2) that secures the optical-drive assembly to the base cover.

- **3** Replace the six screws (M2.5x7) that secure the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 4 Replace the two screws (M2x2) that secure the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly. (Only for computers shipped with optical drive)
- **5** Replace the screw (M2x4) that secures the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **6** Tighten the three captive screws that secure the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.

For computers shipped without optical drive

1 Connect the battery cable to the system board, if applicable.



CAUTION: To avoid accidental damage to the power-adapter port, do not press the base cover against the power-adapter port when you snap the base cover to the computer base.



- 2 Place the base cover on the palm rest and keyboard assembly, and snap the base cover into place starting from the power-adapter port.
- **3** Replace the six screws (M2.5x7) that secure the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **4** Replace the screw (M2x4) that secures the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **5** Tighten the three captive screws that secure the base cover to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.







- 2 Slide the memory module firmly into the slot at an angle.
- **3** Press the memory module down until it clicks into place.



- **3** Slide and remove the wireless-card bracket from the wireless card.
- **4** Using a plastic scribe, disconnect the antenna cables from the wireless card.
- 5 Slide and remove the wireless card from the wireless-card slot.





Replacing the wireless card



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Procedure



CAUTION: To avoid damage to the wireless card, do not place any cables under it.

1 Connect the antenna cables to the wireless card.



Removing the optical-drive connector board



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Prerequisites

- 2 Remove the <u>base cover</u>.

Procedure




NOTE: Applicable only for computers that are shipped with optical drive.

- 1 Lift the latch and disconnect the optical-drive connector-board cable from the system board.
- 2 Remove the screw (M2x2) that secures the optical-drive connector board to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



3 Lift the optical-drive connector board along with the cable off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.





Replacing the optical-drive connector board



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Procedure

- 1 Align the screw hole on the optical-drive connector board with the screw hole on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 2 Replace the screw (M2x2) that secures the optical-drive connector board to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **3** Connect the optical-drive connector-board cable to the system board.
- 4 Close the latch that secures the optical-drive connector-board cable to the system board.

- 1 Replace the base cover.
- 2 Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the coin-cell battery



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CAUTION: Removing the coin-cell battery resets the BIOS setup program's settings to default. It is recommended that you note the BIOS setup program's settings before removing the coin-cell battery.

Prerequisites

- **1** Remove the <u>optical drive</u> (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.

Procedure



CAUTION: Removing the coin-cell battery resets the BIOS setup program's settings to default. Before removing the coin-cell battery, it is recommended to note the BIOS setup program's settings.



Using a plastic scribe, gently pry the coin-cell battery out of the battery socket on the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{I/O}}$ board.




For computers shipped without optical drive

1 Disconnect the coin-cell battery cable from the I/O board.



2 Peel the coin-cell battery cable from the palm rest and keyboard assembly.





Replacing the coin-cell battery



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Procedure


With the positive-side facing up, snap the coin-cell battery into the battery socket on the I/O board.

For computers shipped without optical drive

1 Adhere the coin-cell battery on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



2 Connect the coin-cell battery cable to the I/O board.

Removing the fan



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Prerequisites



- **3** Lift the optical-drive connector-board cable off the system board.
- **4** Open the latch and disconnect the display cable from the system board.



5 Remove the display cable from the routing guides on the fan.



- 6 Disconnect the fan cable from the system board.
- **7** Remove the three screws (M2.5x5) that secure the fan to the palm rest and keyboard board assembly.



8 Lift the fan off the palm rest and keyboard board assembly.





Replacing the fan



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Procedure

- 1 Align the screw holes on the fan with the screw holes on to the palm rest and keyboard board assembly.
- 2 Replace the three screws (M2.5x5) that secure the fan to the palm rest and keyboard board assembly.
- **3** Connect the fan cable to the system board.
- 4 Route the display cable through the routing guides on the fan.
- 5 Connect the display cable to its connector on system board and close the latch to secure the cable.
 - NOTE: The following steps are applicable only for the computers that are shipped with optical drive.
- **6** Press down on the latch to connect the optical-drive connector-board cable to the optical-drive connector board.
- **7** Press down on the latch to connect the optical-drive connector-board cable to the system board.

- 1 Replace the <u>base cover</u>.
- 2 Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the solid-state drive



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CAUTION: Solid-state drives are fragile. Exercise care when handling the solid-state drive.



CAUTION: To avoid data loss, do not remove the solid-state drive while the computer is in sleep or on state.

Prerequisites

- Remove the optical drive (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.

Procedure

Loosen the two captive screws that secure the solid-state drive shield and solidstate drive to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.




NOTE: Solid-state drive shield is available only on computers shipped with NVMe solid-state drive. In computers shipped with mSATA solidstate drive, remove the screw (M2x2.2) that secures the solid-state drive to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.

2 Lift the solid-state drive shield off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



Slide and remove the solid-state drive from the solid-state drive slot.





Replacing the solid-state drive



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
CAUTION: Solid-state drives are fragile. Exercise care when handling the solid-state drive.

Procedure

- 1 Align the notch on the solid-state drive with the tab on the solid-state drive slot.
- 2 Slide the solid-state drive into the solid-state drive slot.
- **3** Align the screw holes on the solid-state drive shield with the screw holes on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



4 Tighten the two captive screws that secure the solid-state drive shield and solid-state drive to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



- 1 Replace the <u>base cover</u>.
- 2 Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the hard drive



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CAUTION: Hard drives are fragile. Exercise care when handling the hard drive.



CAUTION: To avoid data loss, do not remove the hard drive while the computer is in sleep or on state.



- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Remove the battery.

Procedure

- 1 Open the latch and disconnect the hard-drive cable from the system board.
- 2 Remove the four screws (M2x3) that secure the hard-drive assembly to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



Lift the hard-drive assembly along with its cable off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



Disconnect the interposer from the hard-drive assembly.



Remove the four screws (M3x3) that secure the hard-drive bracket to the hard drive.



6 Lift the hard-drive bracket off the hard drive.





Replacing the hard drive



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CAUTION: Hard drives are fragile. Exercise care when handling the hard drive.

Procedure

- 1 Align the screw holes on the hard-drive bracket with the screw holes on the hard drive.
- 2 Replace the four screws (M3x3) that secure the hard-drive bracket to the hard drive.
- **3** Connect the interposer to the hard-drive assembly.
- **4** Align the screw holes on the hard-drive assembly with the screw holes on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **5** Replace the four screws (M2x3) that secure the hard-drive assembly to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **6** Connect the hard-drive cable to the system board and close the latch to secure the cable.

- 1 Replace the battery.
- 2 Replace the base cover.
- **3** Replace the <u>optical drive</u> (optional).



Removing the touchpad



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Prerequisites


- 1 Remove the <u>optical drive</u> (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Remove the <u>battery</u>.

Procedure

- 1 Open the latch and disconnect the hard-drive cable from the system board.
- 2 Open the latch and disconnect the touchpad cable from the system board.




3 Open the latch and disconnect the keyboard back-light cable from the system board.



- **4** Gently peel the tape that secures the touchpad to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **5** Remove the four screws (M2x2) that secure the touchpad to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



6 Slide and lift the touchpad off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.





Replacing the touchpad



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Procedure



NOTE: Ensure that the touchpad is aligned with the guides available on the palm-rest and keyboard assembly, and the gap on either sides of the touchpad is equal.

- Slide and place the touchpad into the slot on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 2 Replace the four screws (M2x2) that secure the touchpad to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 3 Adhere the tape that secures the touchpad to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 4 Slide the touchpad cable, keyboard back-light cable and hard-drive cable into their respective connectors on the system board and close the latch to secure the cables.

- 1 Replace the <u>battery</u>.
- 2 Replace the <u>base cover</u>.
- **3** Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the speakers



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Prerequisites

- 1 Remove the optical drive (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Remove the solid-state drive.

Procedure

- 1 Disconnect the speaker cable from the system board and lift the right speaker off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 2 Note the speaker cable routing and remove it from the routing guides on palm rest and key board assembly.



Lift the left speaker, along with the cable, off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.





Replacing the speakers



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Procedure



NOTE: If the rubber grommets are pushed out when removing the speakers, push them back in before replacing the speakers.

- 1 Using the alignment posts and rubber grommets, place the left speakers in the slots on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 2 Route the speaker cable through the routing guides on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **3** Replace the right speaker.
- **4** Connect the speaker cable to the system board.

- 1 Replace the solid-state drive.
- 2 Replace the base cover.
- **3** Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the heat sink



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WARNING: The heat sink may become hot during normal operation. Allow sufficient time for the heat sink to cool before you touch it.



CAUTION: For maximum cooling of the processor, do not touch the heat transfer areas on the heat sink. The oils in your skin can reduce the heat transfer capability of the thermal grease.

Prerequisites

- **1** Remove the <u>optical drive</u> (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.

Procedure

1 In sequential order (as indicated on the heat sink), loosen the four captive screws that secure the heat sink to the system board.



2 In computers that are shipped with integrated graphics card, lift the heat sink off the system board.





In computers that are shipped with discrete graphics card, remove the three (M2x3) screws that secure the heat sink to the system board, and then lift the heat sink off the system board.





Replacing the heat sink



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CAUTION: Incorrect alignment of the heat sink can damage the system board and processor.



NOTE: The original thermal grease can be reused if the original system board and heat sink are reinstalled together. If either the system board or the heat sink is replaced, use the thermal pad provided in the kit to ensure that thermal conductivity is achieved.

Procedure

- 1 Place the heat sink on the system board and align the screw holes on the heat sink with the screw holes on the system board.
- 2 Tighten the captive screws in the reverse order (4->3->2->1) to secure the heat sink to the system board.
- 3 In computers that are shipped with discrete graphics card, replace the three (M2x3) screws that secure the heat sink to the system board.

- 1 Replace the <u>base cover</u>.
- 2 Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the power-adapter port



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Prerequisites


- 1 Remove the <u>optical drive</u> (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Remove the wireless card.

Procedure

- 1 Remove the three screws (M2.5x5) that secure the right hinge to the system board and palm rest assembly.
- 2 Lift the right hinge.
- **3** Disconnect the power-adapter port cable from the system board.
- 4 Note the power-adapter port cable routing and remove it from the routing guides on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **5** Remove the screw (M2x2) that secures the power-adapter port to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.



Lift the power-adapter port, along with its cable, off the palm rest and keyboard assembly.





Replacing the power-adapter port



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Procedure

- 1 Align the screw hole on the power-adapter port with the screw hole on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- 2 Replace the screw (M2x2) that secures the power-adapter port to the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **3** Route the power-adapter port cable through the routing guides on the palm rest and keyboard assembly.
- **4** Connect the power-adapter port cable to the system board.
- 5 Close the right hinge and replace the three screws (M2.5x5) that secure the right hinge to the system board and palm rest assembly.

- **1** Replace the <u>wireless card</u>.
- 2 Replace the base cover.
- **3** Replace the optical drive (optional).



Removing the display assembly



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Prerequisites

- 1 Remove the optical drive (optional).
- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Remove the <u>wireless card</u>.

Procedure




NOTE: Steps 1 to 3 are applicable only for the computers that are shipped with optical drive.

- 1 Lift the latch and disconnect the optical-drive connector-board cable from the system board.
- 2 Lift the latch and disconnect the optical-drive connector-board cable from the optical-drive board connector.
- **3** Lift the optical-drive connector-board cable off the system board.
- **4** Open the latch and disconnect the display cable from the system board.




Note the routing of the display cable and remove the cable from its routing guides on the fan and palm rest and keyboard assembly.



- **6** Remove the five screws (M2.5x5) that secure the left and right hinges to the system board and palm rest and keyboard assembly.
 - NOTE: For computers shipped without optical drive, there is an additional screw on the left hinge.




Open the hinges.



8 Lift the palm rest and keyboard assembly at an angle.



Slide and remove the palm rest and keyboard assembly off the display assembly.





After performing all the above steps, you are left with display assembly.





Replacing the display assembly



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Procedure



NOTE: Ensure that the hinges are opened to the maximum before replacing the display assembly on palm rest and keyboard assembly.

- Slide the palm rest and keyboard assembly under the hinges on the display assembly and close it.
- 2 Using the alignment posts, press the hinges down on the system board and the palm rest and keyboard assembly.

NOTE: Before you change BIOS Setup program, it is recommended that you write down the BIOS Setup program screen information for future reference.

Use the BIOS Setup program for the following purposes:

- Get information about the hardware installed in your computer, such as the amount of RAM and the size of the hard drive.
- · Change the system configuration information.
- Set or change a user-selectable option, such as the user password, type of hard drive installed, and enabling or disabling base devices.

Entering BIOS setup program

1 Turn on (or restart) your computer.



2 During POST, when the DELL logo is displayed, watch for the F2 prompt to appear, and then press F2 immediately.



NOTE: The F2 prompt indicates that the keyboard is initialized. This prompt can appear very quickly, so you must watch for it, and then press F2. If you press F2 before the F2 prompt, this keystroke is lost. If you wait too long and the operating system logo appears, continue to wait until you see the desktop. Then, turn off your computer and try again.

Enabling or disabling the USB in BIOS setup program

- 1 Turn on or restart your computer.
- 2 Press F2 when the Dell logo is displayed on the screen to enter the BIOS setup program.
 - The BIOS setup program is displayed.
- **3** On the left pane, select **Settings** \rightarrow **System Configuration** \rightarrow **USB Configuration**.
 - The USB configuration is displayed on the right pane.
- 4 Select or clear the Enable External USB Port check box to enable or disable it respectively.
- **5** Save the BIOS setup program settings and exit.

Identifying the hard drive in BIOS setup program

- 1 Turn on or restart your computer.
- 2 Press F2 when the Dell logo is displayed on the screen to enter the BIOS setup program.
 - A list of hard drives is displayed under the **System Information** in the **General** group.

Checking the system memory in BIOS setup program

- **1** Turn on or restart your computer.
- **2** Press F2 when the Dell logo is displayed on the screen to enter the BIOS setup program.
- $\textbf{3} \qquad \text{On the left pane, select } \textbf{Settings} \rightarrow \textbf{General} \rightarrow \textbf{System Information}.$
 - The memory information is displayed on the right pane.

CAUTION: The password features provide a basic level of security for the data on your computer.



CAUTION: Anyone can access the data stored on your computer if it is not locked and left unattended.



NOTE: System and setup password feature is disabled.

Assigning a system password and setup password

You can assign a new **System Password** only when the status is in **Not Set**. To enter the system setup, press F2 immediately after a power-on or re-boot.

- 1 In the System BIOS or System Setup screen, select Security and press Enter.
 The Security screen is displayed.
- 2 Select System Password and create a password in the Enter the new password field.

Use the following guidelines to assign the system password:

- A password can have up to 32 characters.
- The password can contain the numbers 0 through 9.
- Only lower case letters are valid, upper case letters are not allowed.
- Only the following special characters are allowed: space, ("), (+), (,), (-), (.),
 (/), (;), ([), (\), (]), (\).
- 3 Type the system password that you entered earlier in the Confirm new password field and click OK.



- 4 Press Esc and a message prompts you to save the changes.
- 5 Press Y to save the changes.

The computer reboots.

Deleting or changing an existing system and or setup password

Ensure that the **Password Status** is Unlocked (in the System Setup) before attempting to delete or change the existing System and/or Setup password. You cannot delete or change an existing System or Setup password, if the Password Status is Locked.

To enter the System Setup, press F2 immediately after a power-on or reboot.

- In the System BIOS or System Setup screen, select System Security and press Enter.
 - The **System Security** screen is displayed.
- 2 In the System Security screen, verify that Password Status is Unlocked.
- 3 Select **System Password**, alter or delete the existing system password and press Enter or Tab.
- 4 Select **Setup Password**, alter or delete the existing setup password and press Enter or Tab.

NOTE: If you change the System and/or Setup password, re-enter the new password when promoted. If you delete the System and/or Setup password, confirm the deletion when promoted.

- 5 Press Esc and a message prompts you to save the changes.
- Press Y to save the changes and exit from System Setup. The computer reboots.

Clearing CMOS settings



CAUTION: Clearing CMOS settings will reset the BIOS settings on your computer.

- 1 Remove the base cover.
- 2 Remove the battery.
- Remove the coin-cell battery.
- 4 Wait for one minute.



- **5** Replace the <u>coin-cell battery</u>.
- 6 Replace the <u>battery</u>.
- **7** Replace the <u>base cover</u>.

Flashing the BIOS

You may need to flash (update) the BIOS when an update is available or when you replace the system board.

Follow these steps to flash the BIOS:

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- 2 Go to www.dell.com/support.
- 3 Click **Product support**, enter the Service Tag of your computer, and then click Submit.



NOTE: If you do not have the Service Tag, use the auto-detect feature or manually browse for your computer model.

- 4 Click Drivers & downloads → Find it myself.

- 7 Click **Download** to download the latest version of the BIOS for your computer.

- Follow the procedure from step 1 to step 7 in "Flashing the BIOS" to download the latest BIOS setup program file.

Enhanced Pre-Boot System Assessment (ePSA) diagnostics



CAUTION: Use the ePSA diagnostics to test only your computer. Using this program with other computers may cause invalid results or error messages.

The ePSA diagnostics (also known as system diagnostics) performs a complete check of your hardware. The ePSA is embedded with the BIOS and is launched by the BIOS internally. The embedded system diagnostics provides a set of options for particular devices or device groups allowing you to:

- · Run tests automatically or in an interactive mode
- Repeat tests
- Display or save test results
- Run thorough tests to introduce additional test options to provide extra information about the failed device(s)
- · View status messages that inform you if tests are completed successfully
- · View error messages that inform you of problems encountered during testing



NOTE: Some tests for specific devices require user interaction. Always ensure that you are present at the computer terminal when the diagnostic tests are performed.

Running the ePSA diagnostics

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- **2** As the computer boots, press the F12 key as the Dell logo appears.
- 3 On the boot menu screen, select the **Diagnostics** option.
- **4** Click the arrow at the bottom left corner.
 - Diagnostics front page is displayed.
- **5** Click the arrow in the lower-right corner to go to the page listing.
 - The items detected are listed.
- **6** To run a diagnostic test on a specific device, press Esc and click **Yes** to stop the diagnostic test.



- 7 Select the device from the left pane and click **Run Tests**.
- 8 If there are any issues, error codes are displayed.
 Note the error code and validation number and contact Dell.

System diagnostic lights

Power and battery-status light/hard-drive activity light

Indicates the battery-charge status or the hard-drive activity.



NOTE: Press Fn+H to toggle this light between power and battery-status light and hard-drive activity light.

Hard-drive activity light

Turns on when the computer reads from or writes to the hard drive.



NOTE: Hard-drive activity light is supported only on computers shipped with hard drive.

Power and battery-status light

Indicates the power and battery-charge status

Solid white — Power adapter is connected and the battery has more than 5 percent charge.

Amber — Computer is running on battery and the battery has less than 5 percent charge.

Off

- Power adapter is connected and the battery is fully charged.
- · Computer is running on battery and the battery has more than 5 percent charge.
- Computer is in sleep state, hibernation, or turned off



NOTE: Hard-drive activity light is supported only on computers shipped with hard drive.

The power and battery-status light blinks amber along with beep codes indicating failures.

For example, the power and battery-status light blinks amber two times followed by a pause, and then blinks white three times followed by a pause. This 2,3 pattern continues until the computer is turned off indicating no memory or RAM is detected.

The following table shows different light patterns and describes what they indicate.

Camera status light: Indicates whether the camera is in use.

- · Solid white Camera is in use.
- · Off Camera is not in use.

Caps Lock status light: Indicates whether Caps Lock is enabled or disabled.

- · Solid white Caps Lock enabled.
- Off Caps Lock disabled.

Flea power release

Flea power is the residual static electricity that remains on the computer even after it has been powered off and the battery has been removed. The following procedure provides the instructions on how to conduct flea power release:

- 1 Turn off your computer.
- 2 Remove the base cover.
- **3** Press and hold the power button for 15 seconds to drain the flea power.
- 4 Replace the base cover.



5 Turn on your computer.

Wi-Fi power cycle

If your computer is unable to access the internet due to Wi-Fi connectivity issues a Wi-Fi power cycle procedure may be performed. The following procedure provides the instructions on how to conduct a Wi-Fi power cycle:



NOTE: Some ISPs (Internet Service Providers) provide a modem/router combo device.

- **1** Turn off your computer.
- **2** Turn off the modem.
- **3** Turn off the wireless router.
- 4 Wait for 30 seconds.
- **5** Turn on the wireless router.
- 6 Turn on the modem.
- 7 Turn on your computer.
