Before you begin

- 1 Save and close all open files and exit all open applications.
- 2 Shut down your computer. Click Start $\rightarrow \bigcirc$ Power \rightarrow Shut down.



NOTE: If you are using a different operating system, see the documentation of your operating system for shut-down instructions.

- **3** Disconnect your computer and all attached devices from their electrical outlets.
- **4** Disconnect all attached network devices and peripherals, such as keyboard, mouse, and monitor from your computer.
- 5 Remove any media card and optical disc from your computer, if applicable.
- 6 After the computer is unplugged, press and hold the power button for 5 seconds to ground the system board.



CAUTION: Place the computer on a flat, soft, and clean surface to avoid scratches on the display.

7 Place the computer face down.

Removing the stand

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Easel Stand

1 \triangle CAUTION: Place the computer on a flat, soft, and clean surface to avoid scratches on the display.

Place the computer on a clean and flat surface.

2 Using your fingertips, pry the stand cover off the back cover.



3 Remove the four screws (M3x5) that secure the stand to the system-board shield.

4 Lift and slide the stand from the system-board shield.



Pedestal stand

1 \triangle CAUTION: Place the computer on a flat, soft, and clean surface to avoid damaging the display.

Place the computer on a clean and flat surface.

2 Extend the stand upward.



3 Using your fingertips, pry the stand cover off the back cover.



4 Remove the four screws (M3x5) that secure the stand bracket to the systemboard shield. **5** Lift and slide the stand off the system-board shield.



Replacing the stand

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Easel stand

- 1 Insert the tabs on the stand bracket into the slots on the system-board shield and align the screw holes on the stand with the screw holes on the system-board shield.
- 2 Replace the four screws (M3x5) that secure the stand to the system-board shield.



3 Replace the stand cover.



Pedestal stand

1 Insert the tabs on the stand bracket into the slots on the system-board shield and align the screw holes on the stand bracket with the screw holes on the system-board shield.

2 Replace the four screws (M3x5) that secure the stand bracket to the systemboard shield.

4 Place the computer in an upright position.

- 4 Lift the hard drive off the hard-drive bracket.

- 1 Place the hard drive in the hard-drive bracket with the label facing up.
- 2 Align the screw holes on the hard drive with the screw holes on the hard-drive bracket .
- **3** Replace the four screws (M3x3.5) that secure the hard-drive bracket to the hard drive.



- **4** Align the socket on the hard-drive assembly with the connector on the system board.
- **5** Slide the hard-drive assembly to connect the hard-drive assembly to the system board.

6 Replace the screw (M3x5) that secures the hard-drive assembly to the display-assembly base.

Removing the memory module

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Prerequisites

- 1 Remove the <u>stand</u>.
- 2 Remove the <u>back cover</u>.
- **3** Remove the <u>system-board shield</u>.

Procedure

1 Locate the memory module on the system board.



- **2** Using your fingertips, spread apart the securing clips at each end of the memory-module slot until the memory module pops up.
- **3** Slide and remove the memory module from the memory-module slot.



Replacing the memory module

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Procedure



NOTE: Replace the DIMM2, and then replace the DIMM1.

- 1 Align the notch on the memory module with the tab on the memory-module slot.
- 2 Slide the memory module firmly into the slot at an angle.
- **3** Press the memory module down until it clicks into place.



NOTE: If you do not hear the click, remove the memory module and reinstall it.



- 1 Replace the <u>system-board shield</u>.
- 2 Replace the back cover.
- **3** Replace the <u>stand</u>.

Removing the wireless card

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Prerequisites

- 1 Remove the <u>stand</u>.
- 2 Remove the <u>back cover</u>.
- **3** Remove the <u>system-board shield</u>.

Procedure

1 Remove the two screws (M2x2.5) that secure the wireless-card shield to the system board.

2 Lift the wireless-card shield from the system board.



- **3** Remove the screw (M2x2.5) that secures the wireless-card bracket and the wireless card to the system board.
- 4 Slide the wireless-card bracket off the wireless card.
- **5** Disconnect the antenna cables from the wireless card.

6 Slide the wireless card out of the wireless-card slot.



Replacing the wireless card

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Procedure

1 Connect the antenna cables to the wireless card.

The following table provides the antenna-cable color scheme for the wireless card supported by your computer:

Table 2. Antenna-cable color scheme

Connectors on the wireless card	Antenna cable color
Auxiliary (black triangle)	Black
Main (white triangle)	White

- 2 Slide the wireless-card bracket onto the wireless card and secure the antenna cables with the wireless-card bracket.
- **3** Align the notch on the wireless card with the tab on the wireless-card slot, and then insert the wireless card into the wireless-card slot on the system board.
- **4** Press down the other end of the wireless card, and then align the screw hole on the wireless-card bracket and wireless card with the screw hole on the system board.

5 Replace the screw that secures the wireless-card bracket and the wireless card to the system board.



6 Place the wireless-card shield on top of the wireless card.

NOTE: There is a cut-out on the wireless-card shield for the antenna cables to come out.

- 7 Align the screw holes on the wireless-card shield with the screw holes on the system board.
- 8 Replace the two screws (M2x2.5) that secure the wireless-card shield to the system board.

- 1 Replace the <u>system-board shield</u>.
- 2 Replace the <u>back cover</u>.
- **3** Replace the <u>stand</u>.

Removing the antennas

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Prerequisites

- 1 Remove the <u>stand</u>.
- 2 Remove the <u>back cover</u>.

- 1 Note the routing of the antenna cables, and remove it from the routing guides on the display-assembly base.
- 2 Remove the two screws (M2x2.5) that secure the antenna modules to the display-assembly base.

3 Peel off the antenna modules from the display-assembly base.



Replacing the antennas

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- 1 Adhere the antennas to the slot on the display-assembly base.
- 2 Replace the two screws (M2x2.5) that secure antennas to the display-assembly base.
- **3** Route the antenna cables through the routing guides on the display-assembly base.



- **1** Replace the <u>wireless card</u>.
- 2 Replace the <u>system-board shield</u>.
- **3** Replace the <u>back cover</u>.
- 4 Replace the <u>stand</u>.

Removing the solid-state drive/ Intel Optane memory module

- **3** Slide and remove the solid-state drive/Intel Optane memory from the M.2 slot.

4 Press the other end of the solid-state drive/Intel Optane memory and replace the screw (M2x3) that secures the solid-state drive/Intel Optane memory to the keyboard shield.

- 16 After the download is complete, navigate to the folder where you saved the network driver file.
- 17 Double-click the network driver file icon and follow the instructions on the screen to install the driver.

CAUTION: Unless you are an expert computer user, do not change the settings in the BIOS Setup program. Certain changes can make your computer work incorrectly.



NOTE: Before you change BIOS Setup program, it is recommended that you write down the BIOS Setup program screen information for future reference.

Use the BIOS Setup program for the following purposes:

- Get information about the hardware installed in your computer, such as the amount of RAM and the size of the hard drive.
- Change the system configuration information.
- Set or change a user-selectable option, such as the user password, type of hard drive installed, and enabling or disabling base devices.

BIOS overview

The BIOS manages data flow between the computer's operating system and attached devices such as hard disk, video adapter, keyboard, mouse, and printer.

Entering BIOS setup program

- 1 Turn on (or restart) your computer.
- **2** During POST, when the DELL logo is displayed, watch for the F2 prompt to appear, and then press F2 immediately.
 - NOTE: The F2 prompt indicates that the keyboard is initialized. This prompt can appear very quickly, so you must watch for it, and then press F2. If you press F2 before the F2 prompt, this keystroke is lost. If you wait too long and the operating system logo appears, continue to wait until you see the desktop. Then, turn off your computer and try again.

Navigation keys

NOTE: For most of the System Setup options, changes that you make are recorded but do not take effect until you restart the system.

- 4 Press Esc and a message prompts you to save the changes.
- **5** Press Y to save the changes.

The computer reboots.

Deleting or changing an existing system setup password

Ensure that the **Password Status** is Unlocked (in the System Setup) before attempting to delete or change the existing System and/or Setup password. You cannot delete or change an existing System or Setup password, if the **Password Status** is Locked.

To enter the System Setup, press F2 immediately after a power-on or reboot.

1 In the System BIOS or System Setup screen, select System Security and press Enter.

The System Security screen is displayed.

- 2 In the System Security screen, verify that Password Status is Unlocked.

Reinstall Windows using a USB recovery drive

Enhanced Pre-Boot System Assessment (ePSA) diagnostics

Δ CAUTION: Use the ePSA diagnostics to test only your computer. Using this program with other computers may cause invalid results or error messages.

The ePSA diagnostics (also known as system diagnostics) performs a complete check of your hardware. The ePSA is embedded with the BIOS and is launched by the BIOS internally. The embedded system diagnostics provides a set of options for particular devices or device groups allowing you to:

- · Run tests automatically or in an interactive mode
- · Repeat tests
- · Display or save test results
- Run thorough tests to introduce additional test options to provide extra information about the failed device(s)
- · View status messages that inform you if tests are completed successfully
- · View error messages that inform you of problems encountered during testing

NOTE: Some tests for specific devices require user interaction. Always ensure that you are present at the computer terminal when the diagnostic tests are performed.

Running the ePSA diagnostics

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- 2 As the computer boots, press the F12 key as the Dell logo appears.

Display built-in self test

The following procedure provides the instructions on how to run the built-in self test for the display:

Diagnostics

Power status light: Indicates the power status.

Solid Amber – The computer is unable to boot to the operating system. This indicates that the power supply or another device in the computer is failing.

Blinking Amber – The computer is unable to boot to the operating system. This indicates that the power supply is normal but another device in the computer is failing or not installed properly.

NOTE: See the light patterns to determine the device that is failing.

Off - Computer is in hibernation or turned off.

The power status light blinks amber along with beep codes indicating failures.

For example, the power status light blinks amber two times followed by a pause, and then blinks white three times followed by a pause. This 2,3 pattern continues until the computer is turned off indicating the Recovery image is not found.

The following table shows different light patterns and what they indicate:

3	System board, chipset failure
4	Memory or RAM failure

The computer may emit a series of beeps during start-up if the errors or problems cannot be displayed. The repetitive beep codes help the user troubleshoot problems with the computer.

Camera status light: Indicates whether the camera is in use.

- Solid white Camera is in use.
- Off Camera is not in use.

Enabling Intel Optane memory

1 On the taskbar, click the search box, and then type Intel Rapid Storage Technology.

2 Click Intel Rapid Storage Technology.

The Intel Rapid Storage Technology window is displayed.

- 3 On the Status tab, click Enable to enable the Intel Optane memory.

- 1 On the taskbar, click the search box, and then type Intel Rapid Storage Technology.
- 2 Click Intel Rapid Storage Technology.

The Intel Rapid Storage Technology window is displayed.

3 On the Intel Optane memory tab, click Disable to disable the Intel Optane memory.



NOTE: For computers in which Intel Optane memory acts as a primary storage, do not disable the Intel Optane memory. The Disable option will be graved out.

- 4 Click **Yes** if you accept the warning. The disabling progress is displayed.
- 5 Click **Reboot** to complete disabling your Intel Optane memory and restart your computer.

Flea power release

Flea power is the residual static electricity that remains on the computer even after it has been powered off and the battery has been removed. The following procedure provides the instructions on how to conduct flea power release:

- 1 Turn off your computer.
- 2 Disconnect the power adapter from your computer.
- **3** Press and hold the power button for 15 seconds to drain the flea power.
- **4** Connect the power adapter to your computer.
- **5** Turn on your computer.

WiFi power cycle

If your computer is unable to access the internet due to WiFi connectivity issues a WiFi power cycle procedure may be performed. The following procedure provides the instructions on how to conduct a WiFi power cycle:



NOTE: Some ISPs (Internet Service Providers) provide a modem/router combo device.

- 1 Turn off your computer.
- 2 Turn off the modem.
- **3** Turn off the wireless router.
- 4 Wait for 30 seconds.
- 5 Turn on the wireless router.
- 6 Turn on the modem.
- 7 Turn on your computer.
